

SCREENING

You will now be screened and go through 4 checks

If you cannot return to your home country because it is unsafe for you, you can apply for **asylum** here.



ARE YOU UNDER 18 AND ALONE?

Tell the police immediately.



IDENTITY AND SECURITY CHECK

- The police will ask for **your name, age, and country of origin**.
- The police will take **photographs and fingerprints** of everyone aged 6 or over.
- **You may be subject to a body search**, and your belongings may be held until the screening is completed.
- **Present all your documents**, such as ID cards or birth certificates, even if they are photographs stored on your phone.



HEALTH AND VULNERABILITY CHECK

- **A doctor or nurse will examine you** for illnesses and health concerns.
- **Show them your medical records or vaccination card**, if you have them.
- **Trained staff are here to help you**. Tell them if you are worried, upset, afraid, or looking for family members.
- **What you say is confidential** and will not be shared with the authorities in your country of origin.



The screening may take up to 3 days from your first contact with the police. During this time, you must stay at the accommodation assigned to you.

SCREENING

OBLIGATIONS AND RIGHTS

- You must remain available to the authorities at the accommodation assigned to you during the screening process.
- You must provide your name, date of birth, and nationality, and present documents or information confirming this.
- You must provide a facial photograph and your fingerprints.
- Information gathered during the screening will be recorded in a screening form, which you will have the opportunity to review.
- When the screening process is completed, the authorities will inform you about the next steps.
- During the screening, you are entitled to accommodation conditions that ensure your physical and mental well-being. You have the right to be treated in a manner that respects your human rights and dignity. If necessary, you are entitled to emergency medical care and essential treatment.
- Please cooperate with the staff and ask them for clarification if anything is unclear. You have the right to use available interpretation services so that communication with the authorities takes place in a language you understand.
- Everyone working here must treat you with respect. If you believe that your fundamental rights have not been respected during the screening process, you have the right to lodge a complaint with the relevant authorities.
